EDUCATING TEENS AND CHILDREN ON IDENTIFYING DANGEROUS SITUATIONS

How the concept of stranger danger and the safeness of our area is harmful to kids' capability to distinguish unsafe circumstances

It is widely accepted that many of the students at our local high schools have grown up in a bubble. Not only does the separation hinder cultural understanding, it also causes a lack of knowledge around safety. Students tend to believe they live in a safe community, in an area where kindness towards strangers is of the utmost importance and protection is a given. This is why so many tourists come to Maine, we welcome everyone as if they were family and offer great hospitality. But when it comes to determining whether a person or situation is safe, students have insignificant knowledge. This does not mean we should abandon our ideals around kindness and trust. Rather, this lack of knowledge indicates that we should instead educate students on how to recognize unsafe situations, so that when they exit the bubble, they will be prepared for the real world.

Lenore Skenazy published an article titled *Raising a Free-Range Kid* on the PBS Parents website that discussed the issues durrounding kids who are overly sheltered. These children will either be unable to experience the world's beauty due to an intense fear of strangers or specific places implemented by the stranger danger idea commonly used or

the kids will be completely unaware of the possible dangers hidden in a seemingly safe situation. Pattie Fitzgerald created the 'Tricky People' concept with her foundation Safely Ever After which is a way to educate kids on how to recognize unsafe people or environments as opposed to the 'Stranger Danger' idea, which merely teaches kids to fear those unknown to them. If schools, especially those inside a bubble, could adopt a course or lecture on the 'Tricky People' concept, perhaps students would be better informed on what to do in uncomfortable situations. This way students will be prepared for life outside the securities of home and for traveling the world.

The stranger danger idea is unreliable and harmful to the characters of children. It promotes a cultural fear that causes children to steer away from public. Stranger danger also can cause for racial profiling and prejudiced attitudes to develop. The idea that strangers are the only ones who perpetrate assault and kidnapping is also not accurate. According to the Department of Justice, 10% of the perpetrators are strangers, 60% are nonfamily members who are known to the child and 30% are family members. Kids need to know that not all strangers are dangerous and that it is

their emotions and knowledge that will help them determine threatening situations.

Here in our area of Maine we don't see this great fear of strangers, as the kids who live here have grown up under the impression that they will always be safe. What needs to happen is that we need to find the middle grounds between extreme fear caused by "stranger danger" and the lack of understanding due to kids being too sheltered. We need to encourage kids to trust their instincts. However, Kids should also know that if something did happen to them that it is not their fault, and if they were to go seek help from a friend or adult they would do their best to help without being angry.

Increasing awareness in schools and households around how to recognize and avoid uncomfortable situations, as well as how to live life without fear of strangers, is necessary in order to enable kids to move through life freely and confidently. Offering support for those who have suffered physical or emotional damage should also be encouraged. In order to better our community, we must prepare the younger generations of the dangerous experiences they may be faced with outside the bubble.

SCHOOL BOARD UPDATE

Over the past month, the Five Towns CSD School Board has approved measures of influence to the Camden Hills Regional High School's student body. At the board meeting in February, changes were approved that will take effect or have impacts on student life shortly.

Student Representative presentation, Dual Enrollment: Student Representatives on the school board organized a student presentation on dual enrollment. Student presenters talked about how dual enrollment was beneficial in giving students a college class experience and will help with college preparedness. They also articulated how the process was mainstreamed with counselors providing support. However, they did say that counselors should do a better job of letting students know the courses that are available.

Student Representative report, Student Life: Student Representatives discussed the experiences they had at Camden Hills Regional High School and what it is like to attend CHRHS as a student. Overall the reports agreed that the experience at CHRHS was favorable over most public schools. The reps said that the school did an adequate job of being reactive to student input. Reps talked about the different beneficial teaching styles within the school, however, they also mentioned the need for teachers to be more reactive to insensitive speaking, especially the use of slurs. Excessive amounts of homework and work was discussed. Stress was also mentioned and attributed to, in part, the focus CHRHS has on getting into a good college. CHRHS opportunities to students especially in sports, arts, and clube was spoken highly of. Economic diversity was mentioned, pointing out the strain on economically disadvantaged families in CHRHS, especially to "maintain appearances."

The Hatchery: The idea of the Hatchery was discussed as an initiative. The idea of "the Hatchery" includes both a course and a space for students to problem solve with self designed inventions. It will also have a space for students to become involved in the community through inspirational talks, meetings, and synergetic relationships between local businesses and students. The Hatchery is expected to be utilized by classes at CHRHS. The course offered is called Innovation Engineering: Agency and Changemaking and will focus on the essentials of impactful engineering. The Hatchery was given unanimous support of the board. The board reiterated that The Hatchery is worthy of being included in the upcoming yearly budget.

All CHRHS students are encouraged to reach out to the student school board representatives-- Molly Woodruff, Sam Maltese, and Julianna Day. School board meetings are held every first Wednesday of the month at seven pm in the Camden Hill's chorus room. The Green New Deal is a recent piece of legislation that was pushed by Representative Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez in response to global warming and the economic crises that plague the US. The bill itself, modelled after the New Deal that bolstered the United States economy during the 1930's, sets its sights on both combating climate change and proposing economic change. This ambitious plan was endorsed by nearly every Democratic presidential candidate, yet does not resonate with many politicians and voters. A smug Senator Mitch Mcconnell called for the bill to be voted on, to "give everybody an opportunity to go on record and see how they feel about the Green New Deal." So far, none have stepped up to call his bluff and schedule a date for the vote, casting doubt onto the future success of the plan.

The bill's implications dig deep into US society, which explains the controversy over it. The first draft of the Green New Deal, which was promptly taken down from AOC's website after media backlash, cited support for those "unwilling to work", an initiative to upgrade or replace every building in the United States for carbon efficiency, and meet 100% of the nation's energy need through renewable energy-without the use of nuclear power. Though this version's existence was quickly denied by Ocasio-Cortez's own political advisor, the Green New Deal has already been seen as unredeemable in many eyes. The revised version has dropped some of its more extreme stances, but still contains a plan to create living-wage jobs for every worker in America, Medicare for all, affordable public housing for all, a 90% tax rate on banker bonuses, and a reduction of military spending as much as 50%, all without a solid plan for how this will all be paid for. The fate of the Green New Deal is yet to come, but it will assuredly be brought up again in 2020.

WHAT IS HAPPENING IN FRANCE?

Up until six months ago, I had spent my entire life in France. I was born there, raised there and, for those of you that are wondering, yes, I adore cheese. When I tell people my story, they are at first a little startled but then start daydreaming. I can tell they are picturing the beautiful lavender fields of provence, the cows milling around in colorful patches of fields in Normandie, or a little goat on a steep mountain in the Cevennes. Others refer to the elegance and charm often attributed to the French people, taking a cigarette break, or Paris, the capital of Romance. But recently, things have been different. People have started to become concerned. The streets of Paris have turned into battlefields. The country sides are infested with yellow vest protesters, putting up camp at every roundabout. The citizens have picked their sides.

The yellow vest protests have thoroughly disturbed France's social unity, disrupted it's economy and has stirred a lot of hatred against the government. Although the protests originally started to dispute the carbon tax (a gas tax) which if put in place would unfairly discriminate against citizens living in more rural areas, it quickly became a nationwide movement. In fact, the movement has even spread to other countries. The gillet jaunes (which translates to yellow vests) attracted most of its supporters through social media platforms which enabled them to regularly gather in cities all around France.

However, this also meant the movement lacked leaders and structure. Indeed, the movement has caused great damages. While most protesters have marched peacefully, others have used violence to draw attention from

the government. They have caused massive traffic jams, set cars on fire, broken store windows, destroyed toll booths, and have physically fought policemen. So far, it has cost France over fifteen billion dollars. The protests have also hindered the usual shopping and tourism that booms during this period, a critical part of the French economy.

Last Saturday, the protests took place, again. The state estimated that there were over 50,000 protesters. Although these numbers have greatly declined since the peak of the revolt in November, when the state estimated 300,000 protesters, the damage and arrests have continued. There have been nearly three thousand injured and eleven tragic deaths since the beginning of the protests. Despite the claims of many yellow vests, the movement has been at times extremely violent. During the regular Saturday protests, barricades were set up, trash set on fire, rocks thrown, and tear gas used. In an attempt to isolate themselves from the violence caused by the movement, yellow vests have blamed the 'casseurs' (or breakers) for all the brutalities. Many protesters feel the media and the French government are trying to discredit the movement by depicting the casseurs and yellow vests together.

There have been nearly nine thousand arrests, many of which were judged as unnecessary. Protesters were taken into custody without valid reasons. Eric Drouet, a man presented by the media as a leader of the yellow vest because of his facebook groups, was accused of organizing an unofficial protest. Despite his denial, Eric Drouet was charged with a month of suspended sentence and a 500 €

fine. The issue clearly became political when he was admittedly contacted by two political parties to be a candidate for the european elections of 2019. Both of these parties are extremists: la France insoumise, a far-left party led by Jean-luc Mélenchon and the other, far-right led by Marine Le Pen (the opponent of the President in the last presidential election).

Today, the Gillet Jaunes are pushing for many different reforms such as the decrease of various taxes, better purchasing power for the lower and middle class, referendums initiated by citizens. These requests go as far as to demand the resignation of the French President, Emmanuel Macron, who is often seen as the President of the rich. The movement openly targets the current government and especially President Macron. Even after Macron's speech recognizing the social inequity and providing reforms to the demands of the Gillet Jaunes back in December, the Protests persisted. Concretely, since the beginning of the protests, Macron promised to cut taxes for the retired that earn between twelve hundred and two thousand euros per month, cut all taxes on overtime, put a pause to the carbon tax increase, encouraged companies to give bonuses to their employees by acquitting them of all taxes, created a public debate where citizens could express their political wishes, and increased minimum wage.

The yellow vests want more. After President Macron's speech, the protesters immediately came up with new demands. Their demands so un-unified and so varied that some feel they fail to convey a coherent message. The world hears about the brutality of

the protests but no longer knows what the protesters stand for. Meanwhile, the rest of the French population remains mostly indifferent to these protests. Yes, protests of this type are common in France. In fact, it is highly uncommon for France to not be going through a protest or strike of some sort. Almost every year, France goes through weeklong train strikes. Last year, one single train strike went on from April to the end of June, and cost the state over 790 million euros. So naturally, the French tend to be relatively unwavered by these trends.

After President Emmanuel Macron made his speech, on December 10th, declaring all the reforms he had instituted in response to the Gillet Jaunes protests, it became clear that no reform or measure would soothe the anger of the remaining protesters. While the yellow vests continue to protest, their number is consistently decreasing. Although many politicians refer to the movement as a social crisis, the French population views this as yet another demonstration of discontent. Other movements have started against the yellow vests. One movement (the Red Scarves)

gathered over 10,000 people to march in protest of the protests.

While the yellow vests surely have valid motifs, their protests are one amid hundreds of thousands of others. So what sets them apart ? Why have they drawn so much attention to France? The answer is violence. The brutality of the movement has been so pervasive that it drew attention from media all around the world. But for many Frenchmen, these "riots" are merely the habitual manifestations of French unrest.

LET'S TRY TO MAKE GREENWEEK A BIG SUCCESS!

Greenweek is a week long series of events hosted by Windplanners to encourage people within our school and local community to find innovative ways to live sustainably. Each day of the week has a theme which helps to break down spcific areas of environmental concern, as well as outline simple ways to change one's lifestyle to be more environmentally friendly.

This annual event will be kicked off this year by

Megawatt Monday. On Monday, March 11th students and factuality should look for tables set up at the entrances of the school on which they can pledge to try to reduce their electricity usage for the day.

The energy that goes into creating electricity often comes from unsustainable sources like coal and neulear power plants. Some examples of small things which one could do to reduce one's elictrical carbon footprint are turning off lights when one leaves a room or unplugging devices when they are fully charged instead of leaving them plugged in all night.

Windplanners will measure the KWH that the school uses that day and compare it to other days to see how many pounds of CO2 the school is able to save just by doing a few simple things.

The next day will be Transportation Tuesday, on which students and staff can pledge to reduce their impact on the earth by using more sustainable methods of transportation. People will be encouraged to make use of public transportation, walk, ride a bike, or carpool on their way to school. Another way that one can be more sustainable in regards to transportation, and thereby reduce the amount of CO2 emissions that pollute our atmosphere, is to combine errands in order to minimize driving. An additional method that you can employ in order to live sustainably is to buy locally sourced products. For example, if one buys a package of blueberries that were sourced all the way in Mexico that has a negative impact on the earth because of all the CO2 emissions released through transporting the blueberries thousands of miles. Instead, one could try to buy blueberries that were grown locally, and in this way reduce CO2 emissions while support ing the local economy. **On Transportation Tuesday** Windplanners will by measuring the amount of cars arriving at school and compare it to other days to see if the suggestions were effective in reducing the amount cars that the school used in a day.

Next is Waste Wednesday, on which students and staff can pledge reduce the amount of waste that they create by using reusable bags, bottles, Tupperware, and silverware. The amount of waste that each person creates without thinking everyday is detrimental to the overall health of the planet. A great portion of the waste people create does not go back into the earth's systems because it is not biodegradable. Other things that one can do to create less of a negative impact is to try to buy clothes second hand (thrift). To avoid paper waste, one can use smaller sized font and choose the double sided option for ones printing needs. Windplanners will also be introducing the recently constructed compost bins in the cafe during this week, and, especially on Wednesday, Windplanners will be encouraging people to be mindful of where their waste goes when they throw it away. Windplanners will be measuring the amount of waste and compost that the school create and also looking at data from the printers to see if, as a school community, we were able to reduce the amount of waste we generated in a day.

Thermal Thursday will be March 14th this year, and on this day Windplanners will be asking CHRHS to pledge to be aware of and try to reduce the amount of heat energy that we use. People are encouraged to wear layers and lower the thermostats. Even lowering heat by just a few degrees can be very impactful in saving energy. Windplanners will be measuring the number of gallons of propane we were able to save in a day just by turning the thermostat down five degrees.

The next day is a new addition to greenweek and will be called Flourishing Friday. On this day students and staff will be encouraged to participate in activities which celebrate and spread awareness about the importance of biodiversity on our planet. Biodiversity is extremely important to during this age because many of the negative effects of global climate change can be combated by the earth's natural systems of plants and animals but these systems are under threat due to humans as well. Many scientists believe that we are in the midst of the world's fifth mass extinction. which is having many negative effects on our planet. We should strive to do all we can to prevent this from happening. People can make a pledge to reduce consumption of products that contain palm oil, as the production of palm oil is one of the leading causes of deforestation in the rainforest. People will also be encouraged to purchase less plastic or to instead by plastic alternatives because of the threat that plastic pollution poses to biodiversity around the world. There will be jars for donations that will go to a variety of organizations around the world which work to help save endangered species and maintain biodiversity in places around the world.

SKY NOON

Sky Noon is a relatively new game that was released on Steam in December of 2018 with very little fanfare. The premise and gameplay is similar to Super Smash Bros, but in a first-person environment and with grappling hooks. At the beginning of each round, all of the players find themselves on a Western-themed floating island, and are given air based weapons with which to blast their enemies off the island to fall to their demise. Despite receiving a Very Positive rating almost immediately after its launch, this game still suffers from complete obscurity and a lacking playerbase.

The Good:

Movement is an underrated component in video games, but it is a subtle factor that can make or break a game. This is why Nintendo spent the majority of development on Super Mario 64 working on nothing but refining the controls to feel natural. Though just walking around in Sky Noon is the same as any other first person game, the grappling hooks add a whole new element of dynamism to the gameplay. Even without the combat, just jumping, falling, and swinging around is solid on its own. The art style and graphics is also strong with a hand-painted, cartoony look that feels reminiscent of Valve's Team Fortress 2. The

game does not lack diversity of playstyle either, with character customization, an arsenal of weaponry, and gamemodes that can be tinkered with.

The Bad:

Sky Noon is a great game, but apparently had no budget for advertising. At release, the game had a peak of just over 100 concurrent players but now, just several months since that point, the number has dropped to an average of three monthly players. There are more empty servers than players, and sometimes it will be entirely impossible to find a match.

The Conclusion:

It can be hard to judge a game that cannot be played, and Sky Noon is the pinnacle of such games. The rare times I have been able to find a server with a decent amount of players, this game really shines. When I spend hours on the server queue knowing full well that I am the only person in the game, some of the bright fun themes of the game are lost. This game deserves a buy from any gamers who are just looking for unique gameplay, or just want to help contribute to keeping this amazingly unheard of production alive.

Although Rent Live had many valuable and entertaining aspects to it, some viewers are worried that it might have ruined the future for live musicals. Not only was it the least viewed of any live musical (this may have been because it was the same night as the SAG Award,s or because it is known to be "edgier" than some more common musicals), but it was simply not live.
